Abstract: Franklin T. Moore was physician and Professor of Obstetrics, Gynecology and Hygiene at the Syrian Protestant College, the former name of the current American University of Beirut between 1894 and 1915. Moore previously held the position of instructor of English, Physiology and Geometry (1891-1893). He practiced photography seriously as a hobby, and tried, during his vacations, to document life in Lebanon and at the Syrian Protestant College at the turn of the 19th and early 20th century. Most of the photos exist as glass plate negatives and are currently held at the AUB Medical Photography Department.

Administrative Information

Source: This collection of black and white photographs passed through various peripheries before it ended in Jafet Library at the American University of Beirut.

Dr. Franklin Moore taught medicine (Obstetrics, Gynecology, Hygiene and Medical Jurisprudence) at the Syrian Protestant College (SPC) (which later became American University of Beirut) between 1891 and 1915. In his free time, he took many photographs of SPC' campus, the various activities on campus, as well as in various parts of Lebanon and Syria. Moore left the negatives glass plates with a faculty member, who had to leave the country due to the Second World War. The negatives were placed in the attic of Van Dyck Hall. In the 1960s, while cleaning the attic for expansion and renovation purposes, the negatives glass plates were rediscovered. They were cleaned, repaired, and identified by Dr. Raif Nassif, Director of the School of Medicine and the Medical Center, who made a set of contact prints of the original negative glass plates and presented them to the Library.

Scope and Content

Most of the photographs in this collection were taken between 1892 and 1902. The collection constitutes a historical record of great importance to Lebanon and the American University of Beirut. The bulk of the images are of the AUB campus, and of faculty and students; the remaining are images of sites in Lebanon and its mountains (Ba'labakk, the cedars, and Nahr Ibrahim), as well as some parts of Syria, including Ma'lūlā and Palmyra. The collection is of value to researchers interested in urban planning, archaeology, social sciences, the history of missionaries in the Middle East, the history of education in the region, as well as the history of AUB.

Biographical Sketch

Franklin T. Moore was born in Bridgeton, New Jersey, in 1868. He graduated from Princeton University with a BA. in 1891. He came to Lebanon in 1891 at the age of 23, to assume a teaching position at the Syrian Protestant College (now AUB). In 1894, after completing his three-year tenure as an instructor of English and Physiology, he returned to the United States to earn an M.D. degree from Jefferson Medical College. Once his degree was completed, Moore rejoined the Syrian Protestant College as Professor of Obstetrics and Gynecology. In addition to his teaching commitments, Moore had medical responsibilities as a physician and surgeon at the Johanniter Hospital (the Prussian Hospital), where the College maintained its medical training unit. He oversaw planning, designing, and directing a 40-bed women patients' pavilion. He was also a member of the Lebanon Hospital for Mental Disease (known as the Asfurieh) and served as its secretary for five years. Moore married Ethel H. Jessup, daughter of the American missionary, Dr. Henry Jessup, with whom he had five children. Dr. Franklin Moore died on January 13, 1915, in Beirut at the age of 46.

It is worth noting, too that Moore's son, Dr. Leonard Moore, a specialist in pediatrics, served as a member of the AUB faculty for almost 20 years (from 1927 to 1946). He founded the AUB Department of Pediatrics and helped establish public health programs in the rural areas of Lebanon.
