A valuable lecture entitled “Motif Origins in Caucasian Rugs”

The lecture given by Dr. Hadi Maktabi covered the origin of Caucasian motifs and designs from an art historical and cultural perspective. The history of famous carpet groups such as Dragon carpets was traced, and an analytical exposition covering the mythical and geographic origins of Caucasian rug types such as the Perepedil and Chelaberd was presented. The presentation was rounded off by a discussion of the famous Karabagh floral carpets which are the most demanded and rarest of Caucasian carpets. The author presented an in-depth historical overview complemented by an exclusive glance at Karabagh highlights from the Hassan Maktabi & Sons private collection of valuable antiques.

The Diversity of Rugs Explored

The rugs from any region of the world are a reflection of the heritage of that area, said Dr. Hadi Maktabi, an expert on rugs and carpets. The Women’s League at AUB organized the lecture, “Angles and Demons: Motif Origins in Caucasian Rugs”, on March 1, 2010, in which Maktabi highlighted the patterns and development of rugs in the Caucasus region. The rugs were distinguished for their straight lines and lack of any curves. The oldest known motif in the rugs is the dragon, a motif that bares Chinese influences. Often paired with a phoenix, the dragon symbolizes the emperor and his empress. Rugs depicting this motif were popular in the 14th and 15th centuries.

Dr. Hadi Maktabi earned his Ph.D. from Oxford University in 2007 in Islamic Arts. He has lectured in international conferences and museums in Washington DC, London, St. Petersburg, and Istanbul. He has published academic papers in several journals. Dr. Hadi Maktabi is a professor of CVSP at AUB.

April’s Recipe: Apple cake

1 ½	Cup of Sugar	2	cups of flour
1	Cup of oil	3	eggs
1	tsp Soda	1	tsp Vanilla
1	tsp Cinnamon	1	tsp (nutmeg) jous alteeb
1/2	tsp (cloves) Kibsh Cronfol	1	cup of choppedwalnut
3	cups of sliced apples	1/4	tsp Vinegar
1	tsp Salt		

Heat oven to 275 degrees. Mix thoroughly oil, sugar, eggs and flavorings. Blend in flour salt, vinegar and sliced apples. Dough should be stiff. Cake red color and crispy.

Make Everyday A Mother's Day

On the occasion of Mother's Day, Mrs. Farouz Ba'aalbaki gave a lecture to the Women's League entitled "Make Everyday a Mother's Day" and following are the most important excerpts:

She wrote:

[I have been asking myself, when was the last time I called my ailing old mother in Amman? When was the last time I told her that I loved her? Even if all these things took place recently, I assert that it was barely enough to claim that I was satisfied with the way I reward my mother nowadays.

From personal experience, I then moved to a number of issues related to the very concept of motherhood. One of these is the linguistic relationship in Arabic mercy (rahma) and the womb (rahem). The same root in Arabic, I observed, is related to two of the ninety-nine Attributes of God, namely the merciful (Rahman) and the compassionate (Rahim). From the Christian faith, I drew on the role of virgin Mary as a mother figure revered by Christians and Moslems alike. Virgin Mary is the only woman mentioned in the holy Qur'an; also is mentioned 19 times and has a whole Chapter in her name where as the other women who were mentioned are referred to indirectly as the wife of so and so, etc.

I strongly suggest that the Mother's Day should be a daily activity which we practice, and not merely an occasion which we celebrate only to be soon submerged by mundane daily activities**]**.
